- I, Barbara Gantwerk, of full age, hereby certify that:
- 1. I am the Assistant Commissioner of the Division of Students Services, Department of Education ("Department" or "DOE"). In this capacity I am responsible for, among other things, oversight of numerous federal and State programs designed to enhance the educational programs of at-risk and special education students as the Offices of Special Education Services and Title I Accountability report to me.
- 2. I have held several positions at the Department starting in 1979. Prior to my current position, I held the position of

Director of the Office of Special Education Programs from November 12, 1994 to January 2006.

- 3. I have asked my staff to compile data regarding Title I funding, Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) funding, and supplemental American Recovery and Reinvestment Act ("ARRA") for Fiscal Years 2010 and 2011. That data, described infra at ¶4, 5 and 7, is attached hereto as Exhibit A
- 4. Title I funding is available to Abbott districts through the longstanding Title I grant programs of the No Child Left Behind Act (2001) and prior to that, the Improving America's Schools Act (1994). This grant funding also includes an allocation for School Improvement Activities or "SIA". For FY 2011, more than \$145 million in Title I funds will be available to the Abbott districts, or approximately \$519 per pupil. This represents approximately 52% of the total Tile I, Part A funds allocated to districts. The per pupil amount is provided for illustrative purposes. Title I funds are provided to districts based on poverty and then allocated by the district to schools based on school-level poverty rates. Per pupil amounts will vary by district and school. The per pupil amount was derived using the 2009 ASSA data as that is the data used to determine the 2011 award.
- 5. In addition to annual Title I funding, ARRA Title I funds were made available to Abbott districts. This Title I ARRA funding was awarded in 2009 for use in FY 2010 and FY2011. In other words,

Title I ARRA funds are a two-year allocation and provided to districts on a reimbursement basis. Districts have until August 31, 2011 to obligate ARRA Title I funds in order to seek reimbursement. As of June 30, 2010, DOE has reimbursed \$29.6 million of the \$112.9 total ARRA allocation to the Abbott districts.

- 6. Districts also have IDEA Part B grant funds available to support special education programs. While the FY 2011 IDEA district allocations have not been completed, the State FY 2011 award is very similar to the State's FY 2010 award and district allocations will likely be similar to FY 2010. Changes over a district's FY2010 allocation would only occur if the district had significant changes in enrollment or poverty levels. For FY 2010, the Abbott districts received 22% of the New Jersey's IDEA Basic award. Assuming a similar allocation, approximately \$72.5 million will be allocated to the Abbott districts in FY 2011.
- 7. ARRA also provided a two-year allocation of additional Basic IDEA and Preschool IDEA for the FY10 and FY 11 school years that is also to be provided to the districts on a reimbursement basis. As of June 30, 2010, DOE has reimbursed \$11.8 million of the \$86.5 million total IDEA Basic and Preschool ARRA allocation to Abbott districts. Districts have until August 31, 2011 to obligate ARRA IDEA funds in order to seek reimbursement.
